**MORRIS HABITAT FOR HUMANITY HOSTS GROUNDBREAKING CEREMONY FOR
SUCCASUNNA CONDOMINIUMS ON OCTOBER 24**
*Congressman Leonard Lance, Local Officials and the Public Will Celebrate
Morris Habitat's Largest Project in its 33-Year History*

SUCCASUNNA, N.J., October 22, 2018 – Morris Habitat for Humanity will host a Groundbreaking Ceremony for the largest project in its 33-year history on Wednesday, October 24 at 11 a.m. Twelve new condominiums will be built on the former site of Roxbury Township's Public Works Department located at 119 - 121 Main Street in Succasunna, N.J.

There will be two six-plexes offering two, three and four bedroom units. Off street parking and storage facilities will also be provided. All twelve homes will be Energy Star Certified and green or reusable building materials will be used whenever feasible. First floor homes will be handicap accessible/adaptable.

"We're very excited about this project because it is the largest we've undertaken in our 33-year history," said Blair Schleicher Bravo, Morris Habitat for Humanity CEO. "We will be working alongside 12 more families who will soon have affordable, safe and decent places to live."

Morris Habitat for Humanity builds more than just homes—the organization empowers families to build brighter futures for generations to come. Home is the foundation to achieve the strength, stability and self-reliance that people need to shape a better tomorrow for themselves and their families. Additionally, every home constructed helps to strengthen the fabric and economies of local communities for all citizens.

The future Succasunna homeowners have been earning “sweat equity” hours by working on other Habitat homes, helping in the ReStore, volunteering in a variety of ways to further Morris Habitat’s mission, and completing home ownership classes. By the time they move into their new homes, they will have completed a minimum of 250 volunteer hours.

About Morris Habitat for Humanity

Morris Habitat for Humanity is part of a global, nonprofit housing organization committed to building homes, communities and hope. Through volunteer labor and donations of money and materials, Morris Habitat builds new homes and provides home repair services to income eligible families. Morris Habitat collaborates with other Habitat affiliates and related housing organizations to improve the affordable housing stock in the region, and over the last four years has more than doubled the number of homes built. Morris Habitat welcomes volunteers and supporters from all backgrounds and serves people in need of decent housing regardless of race or religion. Since 1985, Morris Habitat has served over 400 households through home ownership opportunities, home preservation, and international home building programs. Proceeds from the ReStore, opened 2007, have helped to fund construction of 22 homes while diverting almost 5,800 tons of useable material from local landfills.
